In recent years, talent shows have become very popular with millions of viewers per episode. Each season, they attract thousands of ordinary people in search of a chance in the music industry. However, only a few get past the auditions and come to perform on TV and face the judges, who can sometimes be unnecessarily cruel. It is a long and stressful journey, and winning does not always guarantee a successful career. So is it worth trying? Susan Boyle, runner-up in *Britain's Got Talent* 2009, would certainly say yes. Her dream was to be a singer, but the odds were all against her. First of all, Susan was 47 years old. She spent most of her time alone at home in a quiet Scottish village with a cat for company. She lacked style, looks, and stage presence, but she had an exceptional talent. When this quiet woman started singing in her first audition on TV, she hypnotized the entire nation. These shows may not be perfect, but they give people a chance to make their dreams come true.
